Literacy Tips

Millgrove Writing Journey

Have you heard of Brain pockets, double and triple-scoop words, walking stories, chunk to chunk or sneaky sounds? These and many more are some examples of catchy ways to help our students remember writing strategies. Millgrove School, alongside Parkland School Division, has started a writing journey as one of our literacy components supporting the new curriculum. Our teachers have been learning from experts such as Adrienne Gear, <u>Jennifer Serravallo</u> and Lucy Calkins, to name a few.

Children need to be taught and develop writing, an essential skill that will benefit them for the rest of their lives. Writing helps children connect to the world around them and build meaning. Writing can take children to new places and give them an opportunity to expose their imagination. Writing can develop good study habits that will help them remember important information. Millgrove is working on introducing and practicing these skills with engaging writing activities. Our ultimate goal is to increase writing joy and give our students the tools to enable them to be confident writers.

Every day your child walks through their classroom door they are exposed to beautiful pieces of reading and writing. Students have the opportunity to read, listen and write. Exposing students to well-crafted literature is one of the best ways to increase student writing skills. Parents can do the same at home with daily reading and perhaps even keeping a journal at home where students can respond to books read, which is not only helping with comprehension but a great way to improve writing skills. Here is an article by <u>Reading Rockets</u> that can help support your child at home with some writing ideas.We are excited about our writing journeys in and out of the classroom!

Learning Addition and Subtraction Facts

Addition and subtraction facts to 18 (e.g. 0+1 through 9+9) are an important part of Mathematics. When we teach these facts they are not taught all at once to be memorized. If we had children memorize them randomly they would go into their short-term memory and out again. Children need to be able to visualize amounts in an organized way to learn and remember the facts. We use tenframes to help children see amounts in an organized way so they can use strategies for addition and subtraction. Counting becomes a difficult habit to break if that is the only strategy they have.

We teach the facts in groups by type. We start with addition of 1 and 0 to build confidence and because children can visualize adding one more. Then we go to adding 10 because they can see 10 on a ten-frame and another number with it (e.g. 10+6=16). This is also the beginning of place value and helps to prevent them from counting to add. Then we go to adding 9 (e.g. 9+6=15) because it can be related to adding 10 (9 is one less than 10 so the sum is one less). Similarly we go to adding 8. We use ten frames and/or objects so the relationship between the numbers is visual. Then we go to adding 5 because 5 spaces filled on one side of the ten frame can be seen clearly and become a 10 when adding numbers above 5 (e.g. 5+7=12 can be seen as 5+5+2=12). We continue with adding 2 and 3. The "Friendly Facts" (the ones that make 10, e.g. 2+8, 3+7, etc) are another type we work on. By the time they have learned these facts there are only a few doubles left to learn. When we work on facts we have the children find the type they are working on and the ones they know on a page with a variety of types. This way they recognize the type of equation they are working on and know how to solve it when it is mixed in with others.

Children often think there are an infinite number of addition facts to learn. There are actually only 81 and many of them are the inverse of each other (e.g. 4+6, 6+4). There are many sites with pictures of ten frames and games to play to practice the facts by type or strategy.

Teaching addition and subtraction facts at the same time is a good idea. For the sake of not being too wordy I will address subtraction facts in the May newsletter.

One <u>game</u> to play to practice the "Friendly Facts" is Fish for Ten. Play the game following the traditional rules. The only thing that is different is that you don't ask for the matching number from the other players, you ask for the number that makes 10 (e.g. If you have a 3 in your hand you ask for a 7 because 3+7=10). The ace is the number 1 and you remove the face cards. Have fun! Mrs. G. Wright


