



A planning committee has been put together to plan activities for Wednesday, June 21. Teachers will communicate through their classroom SeeSaw account the specific details of the day.



- students go to class as they normally would and join parents and pets after attendance
- NO PETS are allowed in the school
- have pets on a leash, harness, in a cage or in a bowl, especially if they have trouble making friends
- bring your own pooper scooper supplies as the Millgrove carnival will be held in the same area
- all pets must return home after the pet parade at 10:00 am while students return to their classrooms to prepare for the carnival activities

Prevent the SUMMER SLIDE!

READING OVER THE SUMMER is crucial to student SUCCESS and HAPPINESS in the fall.

Did you know? Reading just 4-5 books during the summer can prevent a decline in a child's fall reading scores.¹

Teachers spend an average of 4-6 weeks re-teaching material that students have lost during the summer.²

Students who participated in summer reading programs entered the following school year with a positive attitude about reading, were more confident in the classroom, read beyond what was required and perceived reading as important.³

5 Ideas and Tips for Summer Reading with Kids

1. Sign up for your local library's summer reading challenge.
2. Ask your librarian or teacher for a list of good books.
3. Start a book club with friends, neighbors or family.
4. Find a Little Free Library near you, or start one in your area. Visit littlefreelibrary.org.
5. Get a free Biblionasium account to see peer book reviews and reading challenges. Visit biblionasium.com to join!

June is a pivotal month where we see much growth in our students' literacy skills. The BIG smiles from being able to read independently or the excitement of a well crafted story that we get to share. There's so much to celebrate as we wrap up some pretty exciting weeks of learning but we can't help but to think of the lazy summer days ahead.

Summer break is typically a time for kids to kick back, sleep in, play outside, and embrace the kind of freedom that only comes with being young and having zero responsibilities. However, all of this free time can lead to what is known as the **summer slide**; *To lose some of the achievement gains that students made during the previous school year.*

Fortunately, learning never has to stop! The best way for children to improve their learning is by reading. Children who read throughout the summer gain skills and develop a better understanding of language and the world around them. Please encourage your child to experience the joy of reading during the summer break. Try to prevent the slide and take the time daily to spend twenty or so minutes reading.

Scholastic Canada suggests the following ways to help your child avoid summer slide.

1. **Make reading important:** Be a role model for reading. Let your child see you reading throughout the day and use daily routines as reading opportunities. Cooking, reading TV listings, looking for information on-line, reading directions, or following a map all provide authentic reading experiences.
2. **Give your child the power of choice:** Having reading materials available is key to helping kids love to read, and the reading materials kids choose themselves are best. Help your child find texts that appeal to their interests, yet are age appropriate and "just right" in difficulty.
3. **Set aside time to read every day:** We know that the more kids read, the better they become at reading and the more they will enjoy reading. During the summer, encourage your child to read for at least 20 minutes per day. Make reading 'down-time'—an opportunity for family members to read together, either aloud or quietly to themselves. Keep track of progress by recording book titles, pages read, and minutes spent.
4. **Talk it up:** Talking about books during and after reading helps improve comprehension. Encourage kids to share their ideas and opinions by asking open-ended questions. Talk about what you read to let them know that reading is an important part of your life.
5. **Be part of a reading challenge:** Most local libraries have summer reading programs that help engage and motivate readers. Kids set a goal and track books they read. [Read Alberta](#) and [ABC Life Literacy Canada](#) have some great suggestions and links to local libraries that have some fun challenges. Our own amazing [Spruce Grove library](#) has a Summer Reading club starting July 1st. Also, have you had a chance to check out [Stony Plain's new library](#)? They have lots of summer programs and just like Spruce Grove, a plethora of books to entertain those of all ages.

Have a wonderful summer filled with books and imagination. I hope you are able to build a routine of reading during your summer adventures and help prevent the "summer slide"

Numeracy Tips



It has been another amazing year of learning and teaching Numeracy with children and adults! Please keep the excitement and joy of Mathematics going through the summer. Some ways to do that are to play board games (actual board games), do puzzles, play card games and do Sudoku. Here are some board games you may want to try: Checkers, Snakes and Ladders, Racko, Qwixx, Prime Club, Sorry, Yahtzee, Sequence Numbers, Clumsy Thief, Crib and Monopoly. There are many great games. These are just a few.

Often during the summer children are using and asking for money to buy treats etc. at the store. Go to the “old fashioned” cash so they are counting the money, adding it and making sure they get the correct change. Using cash makes it more real and tangible for children.

Current grade one, two and three children also have the opportunity to attend Numeracy summer school. If you are thinking about enrolling your child and are not sure please feel free to contact me and I can explain a little more about it. It will run for 9 days starting July 4, 2023 for \$350 per student. For more information, [see this link](#).
