- Due to student and staff allergies and safety, pets cannot be brought inside Millgrove School, so we kindly ask that you do not bring your animals inside the school or on school property at any time.
- As much as we all enjoy pets we ask that you keep your dog at home or away from the playground and general school population during school hours. For the safety of our students and your pet, distance is key.
- We like to honour our pets at the year-end pet parade to give students a chance to show off their furry friends.

If you do walk your dog to school to meet your children after school, please kindly wait on the west side of the fence near the alley way in. Thank you for your cooperation with this matter.



Picture Day - Oct 3 & 4

Picture Day is on Tuesday, October 3 for all students.

Our **Monday/Wednesday Kindergarten** classes will be photographed on **Wednesday, October 4**.

ORDERS ARE DONE ONLINE! View images and order pictures online at <u>smartorders.ca</u>. Ordering information and online access code will be sent home with students on picture day. View your photos online 4-8 business days after picture day. We will send a reminder.

Important time-sensitive reminders:

- Photos will be available at <u>smartorders.ca</u> approximately 4-8 business days after picture day, and FREE shipping is available for delivery to the school for **one week** after proofs are online. After that date, orders can be shipped to your home address with a minimal shipping fee. There is no deadline to order.
- All students and staff will receive a complimentary class photo, courtesy of SMART Photography.
- Memory books will be available to purchase online in the spring. Watch for further details at a later date.

Picture retake day will be on November 2nd.

Medication at School

If students require medication at school, a medication form must be completed in our office, and medication must be kept in the office where it can be locked up, and our office staff can administer it. There are some exceptions for students to have puffers on their person however, the same medication forms must be filled out.

If your child has medication and you haven't already been in touch with our office, please call us so we may ensure documentation is in place.

Volunteering

If you anticipate volunteering in excess of 10 hours over the course of the 2023-2024 school year, we do require a volunteer form and criminal record check to be completed. This is done on an annual basis.

PARKLAND ATTENDANCE

In PSD, we help support families who need help getting their child(ren) to school. We know ther are many factors that affect attendance:

- Parents' work schedule
- Transportation
- Family events
- Appointments

Often families don't realize how much school their child is missing and the impact that has on everyone. They are more behind than you think.

1 DAY MISSED = 2 DAYS BEHIND



19 or more days

Missing just **TWO** days every month can add up to **19** days in a school year. This is the equivalent of missing an ENTIRE MONTH of instructional days.



10 to 18 days

Students who are absent an average of 15 days per year miss **1 YEAR'S WORTH** of school by their graduating year.

9 or fewer absences

Students with good attendance generally achieve higher grades and enjoy school more.



Coding Club

It's been exciting to get Coding Club up and running this past month! We're starting with all interested grade four students this fall, and the group meets twice a week. As a group we decided that each Tuesday at second recess will be a "Learning Day" where we will learn a new coding concept and apply it to a project. We agreed that Thursdays at second recess will be our "Explore Day" when we get to use our background knowledge to play and code with a variety of devices we have at Millgrove.

In October we'll be working on coding video games using computational thinking, and the students already have lots of ideas for creating their own mini arcade games

Literacy Tips Word Decoding Tips

As children learn to read, there are two crucial skills they need: word decoding and linguistic comprehension. Decoding is the ability to apply knowledge of letter-sound relationships, including letter patterns, to correctly pronounce written words. Understanding these relationships gives children the ability to quickly recognize familiar words and to figure out novel words. Although some children may figure out some of these relationships on their own, most children benefit from explicit instruction in this area. Phonics is one approach to reading instruction that teaches students the principles of letter-sound relationships, how to sound out words, and exceptions to the principles.

How to help

With support from parents and teachers, children can learn strategies to overcome word decoding and phonics problems that affect their reading. Below are some different activities to foster those strategies.

How children can practice at home

- Write notes, e-mails, and letters to your friends and family. Represent each sound you hear as you write.
- Play with magnetic letters. See how quickly you can put them in alphabetical order while singing the alphabet song.
- Look at written materials around your house and at road signs to see if you can spot familiar words and letter patterns.
- When you're trying to sound out a word, pay close attention to the print.
- Try to look at all the letters in the word, not just the first one or two.

How parents can support at home

- For a beginning reader, help your child learn the letters and sounds of the alphabet. Occasionally point to letters and ask your child to name them.
- Help your child make connections between what they might see on a sign or in the newspaper and the letter and sound work they are doing in school.
- Encourage your child to write and spell notes, e-mails, and letters using what they know about sounds and letters.

Literacy NEWS CONTINUES...

- Talk with your child about the "irregular" words that she'll often see in what she's reading. Irregular words are words that don't follow the usual lettersound rules such as said, are, and was. Students must learn to recognize them "at sight."
- Consider using computer software that focuses on developing phonics and emergent literacy skills. Some software programs are designed to support children in their writing efforts. For example, some programs encourage kids to construct sentences and then cartoon characters will act out the completed sentence. Other software programs provide practice with long and short vowel sounds and creating compound words.
