## Numeracy



Parent-teacher interviews just wrapped up, and it was so heartening to see so many families asking, "How can I support my child's learning at home?" One of the most powerful ways you can help is by fostering a **positive attitude toward math.** 

We often hear adults say things like, "I wasn't good at math either"—but think about it: we rarely hear people say, "I can't read either." Statements like that, even if well-meaning, can unintentionally send the message that it's okay not to be "a math person."

Here's the truth: **there's no such thing as a "math brain."** What makes the biggest difference isn't talent—it's mindset. Students who believe they can succeed in math and see mistakes as part of learning are more likely to persist and grow.

#### How Can You Support a Positive Math Mindset?

Here are a few simple but powerful ways to help your child see themselves as a capable and confident mathematician:

#### Celebrate Effort

Instead of focusing on whether an answer is right or wrong, praise the thinking and perseverance behind it.

"I love how you stuck with that problem even when it was tricky!"

#### Normalize Mistakes

Mistakes are how we learn. Show your child that errors are just stepping stones to understanding.

"Oops! Let's try that a different way—this is how our brain grows!"

#### Make Math Part of Daily Life

Count, compare, measure, estimate, and solve little problems together—math is everywhere! When kids see that math is useful and fun, they're more likely to enjoy it.

#### **Speak Positively About Math**

Your words matter! Even if math wasn't your favorite subject, try saying things like: "I didn't always understand math right away, but I kept working at it."
"Let's figure it out together!"

#### To Be a Mathematician... You Just Need to Do Math!

That's it! You don't need fancy tools or advanced skills. A little practice, a lot of encouragement, and a belief that math is for *everyone* goes a long way.

Let's help our children see themselves not just as math learners—but as confident, curious **mathematicians.**
